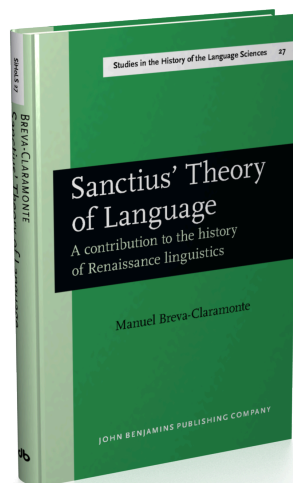

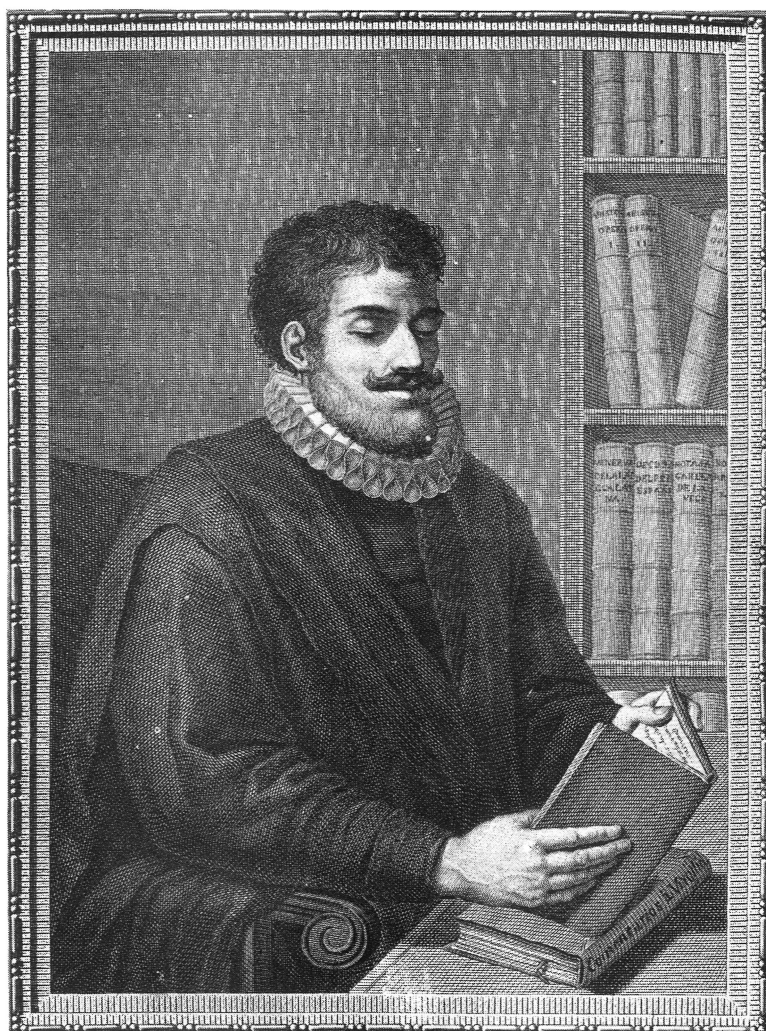
ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS
