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THE EARL AND EDNA STICE LECTURESHIP IN SOCIAL SCIENCE was established in the late 1980s at the University of Washington through a bequest of the Stices' son Glen. The goal of the lectureship is to bring outstanding scholars to the University of Washington to discuss issues dealing with the Bill of Rights, philosophy of law, philosophy of politics, privacy in an urban society, the concept of community, the purpose of government, and epistemology. The lectureship rotates among seven social science departments: Sociology, Geography, Political Science, Women Studies, Philosophy, Communications, and History. In 2002, the governing committee of the Stice Lectureship decided to start publishing a series of short, introductory books based on the Stice lectures.
