

# Acknowledgments

The idea for this project grew out of a conference on “New Approaches to the History of Jews under Communism” held in Prague in May 2017. Chatting during a coffee break, the volume editors realized that while there is significant discussion on how Communism and national particularities influenced Holocaust memory, there is little research that openly addresses the impact of the Cold War on Holocaust memory. This conversation sparked the idea of holding a joint conference on the topic. This conference “Remembering across the Iron Curtain: The Emergence of Holocaust Memory during the Cold War Era” took place a year later at the Institute for the Public Understanding of the Past (IPUB), University of York, in cooperation with the project “The Inclusion of the Jewish Population into the Postwar Czechoslovak and Polish Societies,” based at the Institute of Contemporary History of the Czech Academy of Sciences (ÚSD).
