## **Barz-Malfatti, Hilde**

Past Professor in the Fakultät Architektur und Urbanistik, and member of the Institut für Europäische Urbanistik at, Bauhaus Universität Weimar, Germany. Hilde Barz-Malfatti had a distinguished career both teaching and practising in architecture. Previous teaching positions were in various institutions in Germany and her work as a practising architect included positions with various offices in Weimar and Berlin where she made noteworthy contributions to various projects. She sadly passed away before the publication of this book.

The experience gained in the greenfield KennisMakerij which opened in 2014 was particularly useful in fine-tuning the vision. During the whole process Jeske was responsible for the marketing of the LocHal Library and communication with all stakeholders. She based the LocHal chapter on several contributions from the architects.

he completed his studies with a course in library and information management. Paul Buschmann commenced his career at a one-person library in a college university and quickly combined this with several positions in library organisations that focused on both professional development and cooperation. In 2010 he started working for the Koninklijke Academie voor Schone Kunsten van Gent/Royal Academy of Fine Arts in Ghent where he was responsible for the drawing up and the execution of a master plan to integrate five separate libraries. In 2016 he took up his current position at Ghent University where he has been responsible for the completion of the integration of 50 separate departmental libraries into one Faculty Library. Architect, Urban Designer, Artist, Stuttgart, Germany. Michael B. Frank studied Architecture and Arts in Stuttgart. Erasmus und Deutscher Akademischer Austauschdienst e.V. (DAAD)/German

Academic and Exchange Service scholarships took him to London, where he graduated with a Diploma in Architecture with distinction at the Bartlett School of Architecture, University College London in 1991. He then studied for an engineering degree in Stuttgart. Professional practice in Konstanz and Berlin and an academic career at the University of Dresden followed. He has led his own freelance office since 1997, successfully taking part in numerous architectural competitions. From 2004 to 2011 he worked on the conversion of an historic factory building into the Stadtbücherei Mössingen as the project-architect. The Pausa-Library was awarded several design prizes and led to a new commission: the design of the Library of the University of Konstanz, completed in 2017 and awarded several international prizes. Michael B. Frank has published articles on libraries and lately taught at the Hochschule der Medien (HdM)/Media University in Stuttgart.

Between 2004 and 2007, he worked at Rappange & Partners in Amsterdam. Bart Kellerhuis has been with Zecc Architecten since 2008 and is, as creative director and architect, part of the management board alongside Marnix van der Meer.

Zecc Architecten was recently awarded the Architect of the Year title for 2020. In addition to his work at Zecc, he is a visiting lecturer at the Amsterdam Academy of Architecture, lectures widely in the Netherlands and internationally and is active in several educational roles at Fontys HAN and Arnhem Academy of Architecture.

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Architect, Lia Kiladis architecture, Paris, France. Lia Kiladis has BA and MArch degrees and studied at Yale University and Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT). Between her degrees, she worked for various architectural firms in New York and Athens. In 1995, she attended the École des Beaux-Arts de Fontainebleau and was awarded first prize, a year-long residency in France.
