Alessandro Celi has obtained a PhD in Contemporary History at the University of Udine and the archivist diploma from the State Archives of Turin. Contract professor of modern history at the University of Aosta Valley in 2018. He is currently president of the scientific committee of Fondation Émile Chanoux and coordinator of the research project “La Mémoire de l’émigration,” promoted by the Aosta Valley Autonomous Region.
