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Cover image: Taira no Kiyomori 平清盛 (1118–1181), a powerful military commander in ancient Japan, calls back the setting sun. After his resignation as Grand Minister of State, Kiyomori took the Buddhist vows in 1168 and henceforth presented himself as a 'lay monk' (*nyūdō* 入道) under the dharma name Shōren 清蓮 (later Jōkai 静海).
