

Notes to contributors

Contributions should be in English, though in certain exceptional cases French or German may be accepted. CONTRIBUTORS WHOSE NATIVE LANGUAGE IS NOT ENGLISH should have their manuscripts gone over by a *native* speaker of the language before submission. Three copies of all manuscripts must be submitted to the Editor (address on inside cover).

The only constraint on the length of articles is that they should be no longer than they need to be – authors must write concisely.

Manuscripts must be typed double-spaced with wide margins, on one side of DIN A4 paper (or similar), and should be reasonably divided into sections and, if necessary, subsections. The conventions of the present volume should be followed carefully.

Line drawings (called 'Figures' in the text) **and trees** must be reproducible originals and should be submitted on separate sheets, carefully numbered and labeled. Captions should be typed on a separate sheet and placed at the end of the manuscript. Trees should be numbered as if they were part of the linguistic examples, i.e. not separately.

Tables should be numbered consecutively and titled, and must be referred to in the text. Footnotes must be kept to an absolute minimum. They should be supplied on a separate sheet of paper at the end of the manuscript.

References should conform to standard scientific practice. References are cited in the text by giving the name of the author(s) and year of publication (in parentheses), e.g.

'... as mentioned by Chomsky (1957)'

'... as has been argued (Chomsky 1957: 18–21)'

All citations in the text must be listed fully in a Reference section at the end of the manuscript, by alphabetical order of authors, with complete bibliographical details. Journal titles must be given in full and underlined, as must book titles. The Reference list should be presented as follows:

Book Reviews. We will normally invite reviews, but unsolicited reviews may be accepted. Reviews will be of three types: 'Book Notices' of 500–1,000 words, 'Book Reviews' which deal more extensively with one particular publication (up to 3,000 words), and 'Review Articles' which may include reviews of more than one book, and which will be treated as a normal article.

Refereeing. All articles and review articles will be refereed by at least two members of the Board of Editors or the Board of Consulting Editors. We will inform the author(s) of a decision as soon as possible after receipt of the article.

Replies. Articles of special theoretical interest may be sent, with the permission of the author(s), to Consulting Editors or others, for an invited commentary to appear with the article. We will encourage short replies to articles already published.

Corrections. Authors are asked to check their manuscripts *very carefully before* submitting them to prevent delays at the proof stage. Authors will receive proofs for correction which must be returned by dates determined by the publication schedule.

Offprints. Twenty-five offprints of each paper will be sent free of charge (when there is more than one author, the offprints will be sent to the first-named author for distribution). Contributors to special issues will instead receive six complementary copies of the entire issue.
