It is intended to provide linguists an opportunity for discussions of research and exchange of ideas and solutions. JJL also promotes interaction and collaboration between theoretical and descriptive camps so that together they may lead to a better understanding and treatment of Japanese linguistic phenomena. We encourage submissions that include the following: empirically oriented, descriptive work that includes original observations of linguistic phenomena; theoretical application to empirical work; discussion of linguistic issues problematic to language pedagogy and/or pedagogical implications; and abstracts of recent dissertations. The normal language of publication is English.
