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Pál Fodor was born in Aszófő, Hungary, on February 3, 1955. He studied Ottoman history at the Eötvös Loránd University under the guidance of professors Gyula Káldy-Nagy and Géza Dávid. He received his M. A. degree in 1979.

From 1980 to 1991 he worked as research fellow at the Department of Orientalistics of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences. In 1992 he was admitted to the Institute of History of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences where he is employed as a senior research fellow. In 1993 he obtained the Ph. D. degree with his dissertation on the Hungarian policy of Süleyman the Magnificent between 1520-1541 entitled "Hungary and the Ottoman conquest". From 1994 as associate professor he has been teaching Ottoman history at the Pázmány Péter Catholic University (Budapest-Piliscsaba).

His main research fields include early Ottoman history, the social, economic and military structure of the Ottoman Empire, Ottoman political thought, Ottoman-Hungarian political relations, and the elaboration of Ottoman narrative and documentary sources until the end of the 17th century. Up to now he has published three books and some fifty articles in Hungarian, English, German and Turkish. He is a member of the editorial boards for the periodicals *Acta Orientalia Academiae Scientiarum Hungaricae* (Budapest) and *Keletkutatás* (Budapest, co-editor with Géza Dávid), and he also works for the *Turkologischer Anzeiger* (Vienna-Budapest). With a small group of Hungarian Ottomanists, he is preparing for publication a series of books which shall make available in western languages some of the results of Hungarian historiography dealing with Ottoman themes. The first book in this project entitled *Hungarian-Ottoman Military and Diplomatic Relations in the Age of Süleyman the Magnificent* was published in common with Géza Dávid in Budapest, 1994.
