Editors

Krystal Nandini Ghisyawan was born and raised in Trinidad and is an Indo-Trinidadian queer scholar, activist, educator and artist. Her research and writing have documented Indo-Trinidadian cultural forms, such as Pachraat folk songs; critiqued cultural practices such as ritual purity, specifically the religious purdah of menstruating women; and detailed the identity politics, personal resilience and collective space-making practices of Trinidadian same-sex loving women. Her monograph Erotic Cartographies: Decolonization and the Queer Caribbean Imagination (2022) highlights the ways in which same-sex loving women embody their sexual identities to challenge normative (colonial) notions of Caribbean femininity, space, culture and family as defined through colonial discourse and enactments of power. Erotic Cartographies refers to the processes of mapping territories of self-knowing and self-expression, both cognitively in the imagination and on paper during a subjective mapping exercise, exploring how meaning is given to space, and how it is transformed. Also, Dr Ghisyawan is Director of Research at the Silver Lining Foundation in Trinidad and Tobago. The group's pioneering nationwide school climate study gathered data on bullying in secondary schools across Trinidad and Tobago. She is the primary author of the Foundation's survey reports, as well as guides and manuals for its teacher training programme, focusing on conflict resolution and managing diverse classrooms. She also runs a successful consultancy as a content editor and personal tutor, based in Lawrenceville, Georgia, USA.

Debra A. Harley PhD, CRC, LPC, is a Provost Distinguished Service Professor in the Department of Early Childhood, Special Education and Counsellor Education at the University of Kentucky. She is coordinator of the doctoral programme in Counsellor Education and former department chair, past coordinator of the Rehabilitation Counselling programme, and past director of the Gender and Women's Studies programme. Her research interests include disability, cultural diversity, substance abuse, gender, LGBTQ issues and ethics. She has published books entitled *Cultural Diversity in Mental Health and Disability Counselling for Marginalized Groups* (2019); *Disability and Vocational Rehabilitation in Rural Settings* (2017); *Handbook of LGBT Elders: An Interdisciplinary Approach to Principles, Practices, and Policies* (2016); and *Contemporary Mental Health Issues among African Americans* (2004). She works collaboratively with Counsellor Education programmes and Rehabilitation Counselling programmes at South Carolina State University, North Carolina State Agricultural and Technical University, and Langston University, US.

Shanon Shah was awarded his PhD in the sociology of religion from King's College, London in 2015, where he is currently Visiting Research Fellow. He has lectured in religious studies there and currently teaches religious studies at the University of London's Divinity Programme. He is the author of the monograph, *The Making of a Gay Muslim: Religion, Sexuality and Identity in Malaysia and Britain* (2018). Shanon is currently the Director of Faith for the Climate, a London-based network of faith-inspired climate justice activists, and also conducts research on minority religions and alternative spiritualities at the Information Network on Religious Movements (Inform), a research charity based at King's College London. His research and teaching interests include the ethnographic study of religion, contemporary Islam and Christianity, new religious movements, gender and sexuality, popular culture and social movements. Before moving to the UK, Shanon was an award-winning singer-songwriter, playwright and journalist in his native Malaysia.

Paul Simpson was awarded a PhD in Sociology in 2011. He lectures and researches in Sociology at the University of Manchester. He has published extensively on gay male ageing (including a monograph, *Gay Men, Ageing and Ageism: Over the Rainbow?*), on socio-economically disadvantaged men and health, and on sexuality and intimacy in later life. Since 2012, he has co-edited four volumes in this book series, published 12 book chapters and had published 24 journal articles variously on ageing sexualities and on forms of masculinity rendered disadvantaged. He has published in quality journals such as *Ageing & Society, The British Journal of Sociology, Men and Masculinities, Journal of Sex Research, Qualitative Research in Psychology, Sociological Research Online, Sociological Review and Sociology of Health and Illness.*

They are a young academic and recent graduate of the University of Victoria, with a double major in Gender Studies and Political Science. As an Indigenous young person, Madeline works as an Indigenous Youth Support Worker within the Friendship Centre Movement and frequently directs their attention towards events, supports and programming for 2SLGBTQIA+ (Two-Spirit, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer and/or Questioning, Intersex, Asexual plus many affirmative ways that people choose to selfidentify) Indigenous youth. Campaigning for and promoting Indigenous wellness across so-called Canada, Madeline also serves on two Indigenous Youth Councils (provincially and nationally) within the Friendship Centre Movement. Madeline has published a peer-reviewed journal article in *The* Arbutus Review, on reclaiming Indigenous sexual being as a decolonial and sovereign practice. In their academic, personal and professional life, Madeline frequently focuses on Indigenous sovereignty, community wellness, sexual being and safety, decolonization and queer theory.

Shereen El Feki is the author of *Sex and the Citadel: Intimate Life in a Changing Arab World* (2014), a groundbreaking study of sexuality and its intersection with politics, religion and culture across the Middle East and North Africa (MENA). Most recently, she served as Regional Director for the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) at UNAIDS. Previously, Shereen was a Regional Director with Equimundo (formerly Promundo), where she led the International Men and Gender Equality Survey Middle East and

North Africa (IMAGES MENA), a pioneering study of men, masculinities and gender roles across seven countries in the region. Shereen has also served as Vice-Chair of the UN's Global Commission on HIV and as a board member for Advocates for Youth, a leading international non-governmental organization (INGO) on young people's sexual health and rights. Shereen currently sits on the Chatham House Commission on Universal Health, as well as serving as a member of the Sexual Justice Initiative of World Association for Sexual Health. Shereen started her career as a healthcare correspondent with *The Economist* and presenter with *Al Jazeera*, and is a regular commentator on sexual and reproductive health and rights in both mainstream media and academic fora. Shereen is an immunologist by training, with a BSc from the University of Toronto and an MPhil and PhD in molecular immunology from the University of Cambridge.

Selma Hajri is a Tunisian physician, reproductive health researcher and women's rights advocate. Specialising in reproductive endocrinology, she has more than 25 years of clinical, research and teaching experience on hormonal contraception and medical abortion in Tunisia, across the Middle East, north and sub-Saharan Africa. Since 1997, Selma has worked with Gynuity Health Project, the National Family Planning Office of Tunisia, as well as IPAS, UNFPA and Marie Stopes among others, to advance safe contraception, medical abortion and values clarification and attitude transformation (VCAT). She is also a leading expert on menopause, publishing extensively on her research and clinical experience in the Tunisian context. In 2012, Selma founded Groupe Tawhida Ben Cheikh, a Tunisian feminist NGO, and in 2019, she established RAWSA, a MENA regional network to advocate for the right to safe abortion.

Marcus Kissoon is a Trinibagoian activist who has worked alongside the women's movement for over a decade. His areas of interest are sexual assault, domestic violence, HIV, migration and child sexual abuse and exploitation, safeguarding and children's policies. His research centres on Caribbean masculinities, Indianness and their implications for disclosing and seeking help among male survivors of child abuse. He holds an MSc in Gender and Development Studies from the University of the West Indies and MA in Woman and Child Abuse Studies from London Metropolitan University.

Travis S.K. Kong 江紹祺 is Associate Professor and Programme Director of Media, Culture and Creative Cities in the Department of Sociology at the University of Hong Kong. He mainly teaches gender, sexuality, media and cultural studies. His primary area of interest and research encompasses masculinities, sexual health, sexual minorities and sexuality. Prior to joining academia, he was a senior social worker with the Hong Kong AIDS Foundation for over 14 years, working with people living with HIV/AIDS. Sally Anne Param was awarded her PhD in 2016 from the University of Malaya and is currently a lecturer at Sunway University, Malaysia. A sociologist by training, Sally Anne is passionate about the study of identity politics, where her research focus is that of 'othered' or marginalised identities. While gender and ethnicity are identity markers that feature strongly in Sally Anne's work, her recent research looks at how age and generations enable intergenerational identity to be understood. Sally Anne's work addresses how older and younger people in Malaysian society are generally othered, given primacy placed on the in-between adult phase in terms of status and decision-making power. Her recent work, therefore, aims to give voice to both the older and younger groups in society, as their views are usually politicised as unimportant, eclipsed behind popular 'adultist' narratives. Her most recent joint publication on the lives of the elderly can be found in Educational Gerontology (2021), and her latest publication on young people's mobilities is a book chapter in Aspirations of Young Adults in Urban Asia (2021). Sally Anne is currently a research team member on Future Cities, a funded collaborative research project between her university and the University of Lancaster, UK. When not working, Sally Anne enjoys a literal walk in the park, together with a cup of teh tarik.

Cuauhtémoc Sanchez Vega is a psychologist with a Master's degree in Sexuality and Gender Equity. Over 24 years, he has specialised in sexuality, HIV and AIDS, HIV pre- and post-test counselling, follow-up counselling training for people with HIV, thanatology (how people deal with death), and group work and life skills. Cuauhtémoc also serves as academic coordinator and teacher on the Diploma of Sexology and Sexuality in the Twenty-first Century and as academic coordinator and teacher of the Master's programmes, 'Sexuality and Gender Equity' and 'Comprehensive Gerontological Care' at the Mexican University of Postgraduate Studies. He has published extensively on later life, sexuality and gender violence. His publications include: Scale of Attitudes and Beliefs around Aged Women's and Men's Sexuality (2019); Accumulation of Gender-based Violence in Aging Women's Lifetimes (2019); Sexual Potentialities: A Theoretical Framework for Sexuality (2018); Human Development and the Capacities of Older Adult Women (2015); and Health Promotion for Women Carers (2015).
