

The transliteration from the Cyrillic is based on the Library of Congress system with some modifications. The spelling of Slavic names that appear in quotations from English-language texts has likewise been brought into conformity with this system. However, some names have been retained in their common English forms. Thus Trotsky, for example, has not been rendered Trotskii.

For the sake of uniformity, all dates have been transposed into the Gregorian (New Style) calendar, which the Soviet government adopted on February 14, 1918. Where several dates appear in a footnote reference, the first indicates the date on which the work was written or, if this is unavailable, the date on which it was first published. The date appearing within the parentheses indicates the time of publication of the edition cited.

Unless otherwise noted, Lenin, Sochineniia, refers to the third Russian edition of Lenin's collected works (Moscow, 1934-1935). The first, second, and fourth editions have been checked for textual variations and omissions relevant to the topic. Stalin, Sochineniia, refers to the Russian edition of Stalin's collected works (Moscow, 1946-1951).

Italics within quotations are as in the original texts except as indicated. British spellings within quotations have been adapted to American usage.
