Cigarete smoking declining, but teens lighting up in record numbers

Per capita cigarette consumption has plummeted to its lowest level since 1941. In 1994, a per capita average of 2493 cigarettes are expected to be smoked, down from a peak of 4345 in 1962. (Average is for smokers and nonsmokers, aged 18 years and older.) The first US Surgeon General's report was issued in 1964 that linked smoking with lung cancer.

Overall, approximately 26% of adult Americans smoke, compared with 43% in the mid 1960s. Unfortunately, white high school seniors are not heeding the message: 22.9% of them smoke daily; only 4.4% of black seniors light up daily.

Cardiac ablation system approved

Intended to treat abnormal heart rhythms, the EPT-1000 cardiac ablation system has been approved for use in radio frequency cardiac catheter ablation. This device is *not* approved for the treatment of bradycardia. The system includes a radio frequency power controller, ablation catheters in different styles, accessory cables, and a foot switch.

In a preclinical trial involving 456 patients at 12 medical centers, the device was successful in treating 85% of patients with abnormal heart rhythm that originated in a single site in the heart. A second procedure was necessary in 11% of the patients. Serious complications occurred in 16 patients. Among these complications

were myocardial infarction, stroke, blockage of the pulmonary vessels, infection of the heart muscle, and death.

Number of uninsured Americans on the rise

An estimated 39.7 million Americans had no healthcare insurance in 1993, according to the government survey *Supplement to the Current Population Survey*, published in March 1994. Contrary to popular belief, most of the uninsured were not poor: almost 75% of the uninsured had incomes above the poverty line of

\$15,000 for a family of four. In 1992, 1.1 million fewer persons had no medical coverage.

Increasing numbers of Americans are turning to state-supported Medicaid: Between 1987 and 1993, 11 million persons received such assistance. Most of these recipients were women and children.

At the same time, the number of employers providing healthcare insurance in 1993 declined from the previous year, down to 57% compared with 62%.

The Employee Benefits Research Institute is expected to release a separate report in January outlining its yearly analysis. •
