Georg Borges – Liability for AI Systems Under Current and Future Law – An overview of the key changes envisioned by the proposal of an EU-directive on liability for AI

This article discusses liability for AI systems *de lege lata* and *de lege ferenda* on the basis of European and German law with special consideration of the EU Commission's regulatory proposal for a directive on liability for artificial intelligence (AI). After a brief introduction of the current state of legislative proposals concerning AI and liability (I.), the characteristic features of AI system and their relationship with the concepts of AI system as well as the requirements for human fault for liability are carved out (II.) and different liability regimes considered (III.), before the Commission's approach to liability for AI taken in its proposal for a directive is thoroughly analysed in the light of its impact on the gathering evidence and the burden of proof in liability claims (IV.) and the findings are summarised (V.).
