"Many years ago, in the context of a Groningen Hellenistic Poetry Workshop luncheon, I suggested that this poem might be meant as a quasi-humorous comment on the completion of the *Aetia*, the Four Graces being the four books of the poem (the Charites as poetry is a term familiar already from Simonides)."

I realize now with regret that this phrasing may be taken inadvertently to imply that Andrej and Ivana Petrovic's paper "Stop and Smell the Statues: Callimachus' Epigram 51Pf. Reconsidered (Four Times)" published in Materiali e discussioni per l'analisi dei testi classici, No. 51 (2003), pp. 179–208, and arguing this point in detail, was based on my idea. This was never my intention, and I apologize for any distress I have caused.
